### **Toastmaster Profile**

Although Eric Matto is one of our club's newest members, having joined us just this past May, he is also our most seasoned Toastmaster. Eric has a very long and interesting history with our organization, in both Canada and the United States. We are very pleased to feature a profile on his life, and on his experiences with Toastmaster's in this issue of Voice of the Valley.



RB: Eric, you are a fairly new member of the club and many of us don't know much about your background. Can you tell us a bit about yourself.

Eric: I was born in Toronto but grew up in Etobicoke, and have spent a lot of my adult life living in either Etobicoke or Mississauga. In the mid-1980's I spent 2 years in Ottawa and from 1998 until mid-2002 I was living in the Chicago area. I am single, and I come from a large family. I have 4 sisters and 2 brothers, 5 nieces and 2 nephews.

### RB: What type of work do you do?

Eric: I'm an IT consultant, working primarily on analysis and programming in the IBM mainframe environment. Currently I'm on a project at Clarica Life Insurance in Waterloo.

RB: I was very impressed to learn that you have attained the highest standing that a Toastmaster can achieve—The DTM designation. You have obviously stayed with Toastmasters for many years, but what first prompted your decision to join?

Eric: I joined in the fall of 1987. I saw an article in the newspaper which interested me, and I clipped this and put it in my wallet. Six months later I found this clipping, and called the contact number. I went to a meeting, and then came back to the following week and joined. I was interested in improving my communication skills and getting over my shyness in groups. When I first joined I thought the most I would do was get my CTM. I didn't plan or expect to get involved in the leadership side or still be a member 15 years later!

RB: Were there any difficulties/ stumbling blocks you had to overcome to achieve the DTM designation. And how have you benefited from obtaining it?

Eric: I received my DTM in 1996, approximately 8 years after I first joined Toastmasters. This was before they changed to the new educational program, where the DTM is (I think) easier to get now. Back then many of the requirements had time restrictions in that if you didn't get your DTM within so many years of fulfilling a specific requirement then you had to do that requirement again. It was a real exercise in organization and self-discipline, and I'm proud of the fact that I did it.

# RB: Over the years which club officer roles have you held?

Eric: At the Club level - Secretary, Treasurer, Sergeant at Arms, VP Education, President. Also District offices - in District 60 I was Area Governor and Division Governor. In District 30 (Chicago) I was Area Governor, Lt. Governor Marketing, Lt. Governor Education & Training and District Governor.

RB: Have you participated in any speech/evaluation/table topics contests outside of the club?

Eric: Yes - I've competed in Table Topics and Evaluation at the Area level. During my years as a District officer I was ineligible to compete. I've served as a judge and in other functions up to the Regional level. At the International level, I was the Timer for the 1999 World Championship of Public Speaking in Chicago, and had been invited to be a judge in 2002 at San Antonio but was unable to attend.

RB: What has been your experience attending the International Conventions? Do you feel it is worthwhile for club members to incur the time and expense to go?

Eric: I've been to 1993 Toronto, 1999 Chicago, 2000 Miami Beach and 2001 Anaheim. I would have gone to 2002 San Antonio except that I started a new job the same week as the convention. I have really enjoyed attending for a variety of reasons: the opportunity to meet people, to benefit by attending the educational workshops, and of course seeing the World Championship of Public Speaking.

I know it's financially difficult for many club members to experience this event, but I should remind everyone that the 2005 International Convention is in Toronto. This would be a great opportunity to attend without incurring the expense of airfare and a hotel room. I would also suggest that you get involved as a volunteer, since you'll get so much more out of this experience.

RB: What is your best memory of your Toastmasters involvement?

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I was interested to read the article "Toastmasters Opinion" in your September 2002 issue (page 9), especially with reference to the author's encounter with Albert Mensah.

I had the pleasure of seeing Albert win 2nd place in Toastmasters International's 1999 World Championship of Public Speaking which was held in Chicago. As many of you know, I lived in Chicago from 1998-2002 and was active in the local District 30 organization there. I served as a Timer for that contest, and thus had a front row center seat in a hotel ballroom with over a thousand people in it. Albert was also the keynote speaker at District 30's 2002 Spring Conference in suburban Chicago, and we had specifically invited him to return to the city where he did so well in the World Championships a few years earlier. I had been in contact with him via phone and email to make these arrangements, and had the chance to meet him in person since I was the one who ended up picking him up at the airport.

As your article mentions, Albert Mensah is indeed a special person. I remember him telling me that when he was getting ready to compete he wanted all the feedback that he could get from any source. On one occasion he drove seven hours one way to give his seven minute speech at a club because he heard that they gave good evaluations!

Eric: There are many but a few of the highlights would have to be:

- Carrying the Canadian flag in the opening ceremonies of the 1999 International Convention in Chicago. Because the International President at the time (Terry Daily) was a Canadian, I was in a position of honour at the end of the parade with the US flag carrier and got to stand on stage while "O Canada" was played.
- Visiting World Headquarters in Rancho Santa Margarita, California in 2001, during my trip to that year's International Convention at Anaheim.
- Serving as a Top 3 officer in District 30, especially District Governor in 2001-02. It was a lot of hard work and very challenging, but ultimately rewarding as well, when I saw the effect I could make on an entire District of 120+ clubs and 2500+ members.

## RB: What keeps you coming back to Toastmasters?

Eric: I still feel like I have a lot to learn and improve on. I also believe that my experience can be of benefit to other newer members, and I feel that I am in some way re-paying those senior members who helped me when I first joined.

RB: What has been the biggest impact TM has had on your life?

Eric: It's given me a sense of purpose.

### RB: How would you like to see Mississauga Valley Toastmasters evolve?

I think this is a good club with a lot of potential to be a great club. I'd like to see more people getting involved in the club, whether by taking on meeting roles, giving speeches, or participating as club officers.

# Speechcraft

I recall a Toastmaster Meeting when a new Toastmaster stood up and asked, what is a "Speechraft". Perhaps we do not talk about it enough at meetings. New members are not always aware of what it is.

I will start out by telling you that I became a Toastmaster because of a Speechcraft course. I was at the distress Centre of Peel as a volunteer, and this course was offered. The price was a mere \$10 for eight weeks of instruction. Where could you get a better deal than that? The cost to the Distress Centre was \$25 per person, and the individual volunteer had to pay \$10. The rest was subsidized by the Centre.

It was at a time in my life when I had to introduce Mayor McCallion at a meeting in an organization that I was a member of. I had absolutely no experience with public speaking and had no idea how I was going to introduce such a prominent person.

When the Speechcraft course was offered, I quickly signed up. What a golden opportunity for me! For a mere \$10 I could learn how to be a public speaker, and especially learn how to introduce a speaker.

The facilitator of this course was Mirko, and he was an excellent one! He got us all enthused immediately about the course, and what it would be able to do for us. There were ten people in this group, and Mirko had lots of help from other Toastmasters who had much of offer us.

The very first week we learned about table topics. We were all very timid at first, but gradually became experts (?)! We had a wonderful time with the course, and it lead me to look further into Toastmasters. I attended a few regular meetings, but did not join at that time.

The second time Mirko did a Speechcraft course at the Distress Centre I went again because I was so interested in public speaking. I felt that by attending one more time I could improve. And I was right. This course was even better. Mirko made it so interesting for us, and the result was that he brought four new Toastmasters.

# Truly a success story for Mirko!

After I became a CTM at Toastmasters I decided to spread my wings, and be the facilitator at the next course at the Distress Centre. It is very different when you are the facilitator! You become the expert!!! Not that I felt that I was, but the "students" of the course think you are. So now you are learning by teaching. Many Toastmasters came out to help with this course.

As facilitator, you are the chair of the meeting every week for eight weeks, and it definitely increases your skills of persuasion in getting people to help. After the first few weeks a student is assigned table topics. After two weeks they have been taught the role of Toastmaster, and one of them takes on that assignment. Then they get into other roles, like General Evaluator and Evaluators of each others' speeches. In eight weeks they do seven speeches! I am always amazed at how well they fall into the role of speakers, and the exciting topics that they choose to talk about. By the end of the eighth week it is amazing how much they have accomplished!

I liken it to a flower bud, that opens in the bright sunshine! I had one student who was very shy, and had some problems with the language. After the sunshine hit he became a good speaker, and showed that he had a terrific sense of humour

To date, I have facilitated four Speechcraft courses. Two were at the Distress Centre of Peel and one was at the Heart and Stroke foundation, and the fourth was at a business in Mississauga. Each one was a learning experience for me, and I think I learned more than the students.

In closing may I suggest that you look for a place to conduct a course, and then do it!


As some of you are aware, this past summer I organized an eight week Youth Speechcraft Session for the Mississauga Chinese Association. There were nine participants ranging in age from thirteen to eighteen. The objective was to teach kids the basics of public speaking to boost their confidence and to provide leadership skills. The format of the meetings was similar to those at our club, with agenda items such as Table Topics, speeches and evaluations.

I am very fortunate to have worked with these bright and energetic kids and proud to have witnessed their progress and improvement over the eight weeks. I am a strong advocate that the best time to expose people to new things, such as public speaking, is at an early age when they have fewer inhibitions, rather than later on in life. I wish someone had introduced me to Toastmasters when I was in my teens.

An interesting observation I made at the meetings was that most of the kids were not afraid to come up and speak before their peers but were there rather to improve their technical speaking skills such as vocal variety, body gestures and choice of words.

Based on feedback from the kids the program was a success. I would like to thank Phil Taylor, Tony, Whitney, Rosemary, Fernando, Dawn. Peter, Betty and Eric for their support.




